

Jersey Bulls

General statement: Jersey bulls are a popular breed of cattle all round the world.

History: The Jersey Bulls were found in Jersey in 1880. It got its name from where it was found.

Where does it grow? They grow all around the world mostly in Jersey and New Jersey and like to be in hotter climates and like to breed in hotter parts of the world so it can get bigger and healthier calves and like it in the northern equator or higher in the shorthorn equator.

How does it grow? As a baby (calf) it drinks milk from its mother. As it gets older it starts eating Grass and/or maize and by drinking water.

What does it look like? A Jersey Bull looks like a orange cat but is much bigger and has white spots or sometimes black. They come in all shades of brown, from light tan to almost black. All purebred Jerseys have a lighter band around their nose, a dark switch (long hair on the end of the tail), and has black hooves.

Special features or uses they are used for semen and meat. Jersey Bulls can grow bigger than a human 540 to 820 KG.
